Overall comments:	Overall, this is a high-quality evaluation that can be used by decision-makers with confidence. The evaluation is grounded in a strong methodological approach that draws on multiple methods and sources to gather a mix of qualitative and quantitative data. The methodology is well explained, although it is not entirely clear how many individuals were consulted nor is the sampling strategy for site visits adequately explained. The findings respond to all evaluation questions, drawing on a reliable data set that has been adequately triangulated. Similarly, the findings, conclusions and recommendations successfully integrate a gender equality and equity analysis. In addition, the methodology includes one question that addresses disability inclusion and also confirms that marginalized groups, including people living with disability (PWD), were to the extent possible consulted. However, the voices of PWDs do not come out clearly in the findings. The findings and conclusions adequately address issues of disability inclusion, but the evaluation does not offer recommendations to improve disability inclusion. Overall, the evaluation offers strong and forward-looking conclusions. Likewise, the recommendations are also of good quality, although more specific actions could have been proposed to further guide implementation. Finally, the report is well written but could have benefitted from being edited to fix typos and punctuation errors.

activities, outputs, and expected outcomes by having all boxes link to the ones above and beside them. The ToC also includes 'areas' of assumptions, although these are vague stating only that "Risks and Assumptions

based on Social, Cultural, Technological, Financial, Political, economic and environmental factors".
