Independent mid-term evaluation of the UNFPA Supplies Partnership 2021–2030





Evaluation Brief

The UNFPA Supplies Partnership is a key global flagship programme, ensuring sustainable, equitable access to sexual and reproductive health (SRH) commodities, including modern contraceptives and life-saving maternal health medicines. As a key driver of the UNFPA Strategic Plan, the Partnership directly contributes to eliminating unmet need for family planning and ending preventable maternal mortality. The UNFPA Independent Evaluation Office assessed the performance of the Partnership in expanding access to modern contraceptives and life-saving maternal health medicines particularly in hard-to-reach areas, and in strengthening health systems necessary to sustain and enhance these efforts.

Key messages

- With its strategic shift toward government ownership, mutual accountability, and sustainable domestic financing, the Partnership aligns well with global development principles.
- While the Partnership's country eligibility and classification criteria are robust and contextually grounded, the lack of a transition strategy remains a gap and the role of the Partnership in the humanitarian-development-peace continuum has yet to be clearly defined.
- Phase III governance reforms have enhanced transparency, inclusivity, and stakeholder engagement, but the meaningful participation of civil society and country-level stakeholders remain uneven.
- Despite strong adaptability and government engagement the Partnership's collaboration with other local partners remains limited, which constrains its ability to strengthen national ownership and sustainability required for health system strengthening.
- With tools such as the Compact and Match Fund, the Partnership has effectively catalysed national commitments to sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) financing and incentivizing results by linking funding to progress.
- While UNFPA's strategic position enables it to serve as a powerful advocate and convener in the SRHR space, the decline in donor contributions and overall funding cuts pose a risk to the Partnership's sustainability.
- The **Partnership's implementation capacity is constrained** by a gap in human resource capacity, notably in sustainable financing, supply chain management and advocacy.

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Recommendations

- 1. Clarify and consistently communicate the partnership's strategic focus.
- 2. Revise the classification of programme countries to reflect their political, economic and health contexts.
- Identify programming aspects and contexts for strengthening work in humanitarian contexts.
- 4. Intensify resource mobilization by **diversifying the Partnership's funding sources** and by strengthening domestic resource mobilization in programme countries.
- 5. Optimize Steering Committee and sub-committee processes to improve efficiency, strengthen country representation, and bolster governance.
- 6. Strengthen support to UNFPA country offices to enhance collaboration and coordination with in-country partners to address systemic SRH challenges more effectively.
