Gap mapping/analysis of relevant evaluative evidence and knowledge gaps that are strategically important to inform the design and implementation of the upcoming country programme	The Bosnia and Herzegovina Country Office (CO) completed a country programme evaluation (2021-2025), and reviewed the existing centralized, regional and country-level evaluative evidence to develop a comprehensive evaluative evidence mapping, which informed the development of the new country programme (CP) (2026-2030). Based on the existing evidence, the following was concluded:  • For Output 1 of the CP, the evaluation has shown the need for further engagement of UNFPA in the provision of technical support and advocacy towards evidence-based development, adoption and financing of relevant policies and legislation across all subnational levels of government.  • For Output 2 of the CP, evaluations emphasise the need for further strengthening the capacities of relevant government authorities and women's associations for provision of higher quality services to persons in vulnerable situations. Current Protected Health Information (PHI) data suggest high mortality from preventable reproductive cancers and the need for development and adoption of relevant screening programmes. CO is currently working on research that will shed more light on ongoing capacities of the health authorities to provide screening and timely treatment of reproductive cancers. Based on GBV prevalence data (2019), there is further need for strengthening referral systems in the country and the provision of public services to survivors of GBV (and CRSV). However, there is data missing to better understand the levels of satisfaction of survivors with the existing protection services. To learn more, UNFPA will join the UN Women and the International Organization for Migration (IOM) to work on the evaluation of the current women, peace and security project.

• For **Output 3 of the CP**, there is available data on labour market participation of women and active employment measures reported by the International Labor Organization (ILO). However, there is little or no understanding of the skills and needs of women in vulnerable situations that would ensure adequate policies for their empowerment. UNFPA plans to collect such data in cooperation with University College London and support governments with the development of women's empowerment policies and legislation. The ongoing peace-building initiatives will be continued into the next Country Programme Document (CPD) as it is seen as the foundation for all other work of UNFPA in the country, especially from the perspective of demographic resilience where <u>youth emigration data (2021)</u> shows the lack of social cohesion as one of the main factors of emigration.
