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

42 journalists improved their knowledge and capacity on national and international mechanisms for combating violence against women and girls

Prevention materials were developed in Braille for blind youth and adolescents on sexually transmitted infections, the human immunodeficiency virus and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (STI/HIV/ AIDS), demonstrating innovation in reaching marginalized populations

80 youth, including youth with disabilities, benefited from capacity strengthening on healthy behaviour and sexual and reproductive health

Key Results Achieved in 2024



The first national strategy to address gender-based violence was developed, establishing a framework for multisectoral gender-based violence prevention and response

The national gender policy's operational plan was integrated into all five regional development plans

Over 12,000 new users benefited from modern contraceptive methods, and over 12,800 women and girls received sexual and reproductive health information and services

94 per cent of health facilities reported no contraceptive stockouts, ensuring consistent nationwide access to family planning services

The first One Stop Centre for genderbased violence was established at Balbala Hospital, providing integrated medical, psychosocial and legal support to survivors

Key Results Achieved in 2024



Over 1.6 million people accessed family planning and other reproductive health services in UNFPA-supported facilities

A youth network expanded to over 52,000 young people, including people with disabilities, with members participating in youth engagement activities across multiple governorates

25 committees were established to review maternal death cases in 20 hospitals

The Arabic version of the comprehensive sexuality education curriculum was implemented in collaboration with the School Health Department and the National Reproductive Health Programme, to train health educators and pre-trained health workers

19 Youth Friendly Spaces were supported across multiple governorates, with some centres dual-purposed as Women and Girls Safe Spaces in afternoon hours

Key Results Achieved in 2024



Over 4 million people accessed high-quality reproductive, maternal, neonatal, child and adolescent health services through 533 midwife-led Family Health Houses in 26 provinces

Over 34,000 health workers in remote locations received technical assistance through the Midwifery Helpline to respond to maternal health cases

Over 7 million internally displaced persons, returnees and host communities accessed services through mobile health teams and static health facilities

Over 2 million women and girls benefited from psychosocial support information and services through specialized centres and teams across all 34 provinces

Over 774,000 adolescents and youth accessed sexual and reproductive health information and counselling services through 152 integrated youthfriendly facilities

Over 57,000 persons with disabilities benefited from inclusive services spanning maternal health, psychosocial support and meaningful youth engagement initiatives

Key Results Achieved in 2024



All designated comprehensive emergency obstetric and newborn care (EmONC) centres now implement maternal and neonatal death reporting and review, nearmiss reporting and expanded contraceptive choice through implant introduction

Key guidance was developed included an integrated reproductive, maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health strategy; an action plan for the National Gender Quality Policy; and a National Strategy and Framework of Action on the Elimination of Gender-Based Violence

Sexual and reproductive health and gender-based violence components were integrated into the revised Health **Emergency and Disaster Contingency** Plan, ensuring service continuity during emergencies

61 per cent of schools have at least two teachers trained with knowledge and skills to deliver comprehensive sexuality education in line with international standards, with teachers trained in an additional 59 schools

50 per cent of districts have functional multi-sectoral coordination mechanisms with trained committee members to prevent and respond to gender-based violence and harmful practices

An action plan to implement the National Senior Citizen Policy was developed, and use of National Transfer Accounts was initiated to strengthen demographic resilience

Four policy dialogues on population and development were conducted with policy papers on urbanization, youth and ageing to support informed decision-making

The "Hattah" programme and "Every Age" pilot were implemented in N. Kudafari, taking a lifecycle approach to healthy ageing and intergenerational relationships

The Emmena Engey Bodu Sirru initiative established a network of community educators and promoted sustainable menstrual products, addressing cultural taboos

283 midwives completed midwifery training, while six national strategies and guidelines were developed including the nursing and midwifery strategy, fistula communication strategy, and national guidelines on Maternal and Perinatal Death Surveillance and Response (MPDSR)

Over 620,000 women accessed modern contraceptive methods in Sierra Leone, with countrywide distribution preventing an estimated 740 maternal deaths, 230,000 unintended pregnancies and 85,000 unsafe abortions

The Prohibition of Child Marriage Bill 2024 passed, and by-laws to prevent child marriage were developed in 44 project communities across three districts

A family planning investment case was developed, providing economic justification for government investment in family planning, contributing to an increase in the national budgetary allocation to the health sector from 7 to 9 per cent

A supply chain design and logistics management information system (LMIS) governance plan was established, creating a comprehensive framework for reproductive health commodity security
